We continue to see the toll our healthcare workforce shortage is taking as our heroic health care workers care for patients during the pandemic.

As physicians, nurses, and other healthcare workers continue to serve Americans during this public health emergency, International Medical Graduates (IMGs) and foreign-born professionals are a crucial part of this healthcare workforce. The U.S. has historically relied on IMGs and immigrant health professionals to provide critical care for some of the most vulnerable populations in our nation, including lower-income and underserved communities, and particularly older adults and those with underlying health conditions in these communities, where we see the most dire and fatal consequences of COVID-19. We urgently need to expand our frontline workforce to provide high-quality and effective health care to our older loved ones. For example, a recent survey reported that 48 percent of nursing and assisted living facilities are experiencing employee shortages due to the pandemic.¹

As a nationwide, not-for-profit society of geriatrics healthcare professionals, including foreign-born members, the American Geriatrics Society is dedicated to improving the health, independence, and quality of life of older people. Our clinician members continue to be on the frontlines of the battle against COVID-19 with some of our most vulnerable older Americans. We appreciate the inclusion of the Healthcare Workforce Resilience Act in H.R. 6800, the HEROES Act, to ensure our nation expands the number of IMGs and other qualified health care workers available to care for older Americans during the current unprecedented crisis and beyond. We urge Congress to pass H.R. 6788.
